One of the ecumenical organizations Shalom supports through our annual budget and in other ways is Faith in Indiana (FII). Formerly IndyCan focusing in Marion County, FII became a state-wide organization in 2017, with eight staff, and chapters in Allen, Elkhart, Hamilton, Lake, Marion, and St. Joseph Counties. FII is a partner of the national Faith in Action Network.

FII's overall mission is reflected in its Families First Campaign. Faith leaders act on our faith values to put human dignity, abundance, and equity at the center of public decisions, and involve congregations in the quest for social justice. The ecumenical, interracial, state-wide board of directors includes every faith tradition—Jewish, Muslim, Catholic, Protestant, and others. Five main goals of Families First include:

- 1) restorative justice- a criminal justice system that promotes healing and reconciliation, shifting resources away from mass incarceration of people of color, immigrants, and poor people, ending of cash bail, accountable law enforcement, and rehabilitation for mental illness and addiction; universal background checks for guns, and ban of assault weapons
- 2) immigrant inclusion- welcoming people who travel to escape from danger, make a better, more secure life, access to housing, employment, education, health care, driver's licenses, and a path to citizenship for 11 million undocumented immigrants
- 3) universal affordable health care- movement toward access for all to preventive and restorative health care, and reduction of costs
- 4) a caring economy- a world in which all workers earn enough to support themselves and their families, paid medical leave when needed, excellent education for all from preschool through college
- 5) fair democracy- automatic voter registration, full participation in elections, fair redistricting, responsive public officials, people at the center of politics.

As participants with Faith in Indiana, we at Shalom join with religious people from many faiths to put our faith into practice for social and economic justice, to improve the quality of life for many of Indiana's most vulnerable people. We serve to reach out as the hands and feet of Jesus of Nazareth.

AID

Last year, Shalom voted to adopt a Memorandum of Understanding with an organization called Indiana AID (Assistants to Immigrants in Detention), which is a volunteer group created to support immigrants in the state of Indiana who are detained at the Clay County jail. Up to this point, Indiana AID has not been able to reach the immigrants detained there because Clay County ended all in-person visitation for health reasons. However, we recently learned that we can connect with the immigrants detained there through a virtual visitation program, and so several volunteers with Indiana AID have spent the last several weeks training and preparing to start visiting immigrants through that program.

We are very grateful for the opportunity to meet with people virtually, but there is a downside as well: every virtual visit costs \$13, and since we hope to set up weekly visitation with several immigrants at once, those costs (as well as potential others) add up quickly. The Coordinating Committee decided that we need at least \$1000 to get this program started, and we thought we would begin by asking if anyone from Shalom would be willing to donate. You can do this by sending a check to Shalom Mennonite Church and writing "Indiana AID" in the Memo Line (all proceeds will go into the account) or by going on our website, clicking the "Giving" tab, and following the instructions that allow you to direct online donations to Indiana AID. Thank you for your support of this ministry.

Deacons

The deacon program, which was formed last year in the wake of the pandemic, consists of seven deacons who maintain caring relationships with every adult who regularly or semi-regularly attends Shalom (except for those who have asked to be exempted). Eventually, Shalom will have a congregational discussion to determine whether we want to adopt this program as a permanent part of our church structure, but for now, as the pandemic continues to disrupt our church life, the VAT has decided to renew it at least until the spring. Because there have been some changes in both the number of deacons and the membership of the church, some people who were previously assigned to the care of one deacon have been transferred to another. Each Shalom attendee who did not opt out of the program should expect contact from your deacon sometime in the next month either to introduce themselves to you or reaffirm the relationship. I love Thanksgiving and I have for as long as I can remember. Thanksgiving is my family's biggest holiday, we gather for two or three days playing games, eating, playing more games, eating, playing more games, eating, well you get the idea. Laughing, hugging, singing, so much joy and fun.

At different times, family members who have been going through a hard period of life have expressed how important our Thanksgiving gatherings have been during those times. That looking forward to the gathering helps, if only for a short time, as a respite to the struggles life has brought. That gathering with loved ones has been a place for support for when they have needed the ears and understanding of family.

Catching up with cousins, aunts, uncles, and as the years have progressed generations keep going, many of my cousins are grandparents so the gatherings have grown quite large and often Thanksgiving is the only time I see these extended members of family. It is neat to see how important this gathering is for so many of us.
