WORSHIP: Our relationship with God Chair: Linda Showalter

<u>Last Sunday (7/12)</u>, we reflected on the Mosaic Law and especially on its emphasis on holiness, which is a somewhat unfamiliar and yet still influential concept for us today. Although the New Testament observes that many people been hurt by being falsely called "unclean," it doesn't reject the concept of holiness altogether. Instead, it calls on us to seek out a Jesus-centered vision of holiness that motivates our actions and accords with justice.

This Sunday (7/19), we will study the worship system that is established in the Mosaic law with its tabernacle, priests, and sacrificial system, and consider why it is so important for us to participate in particular religious rituals even to this day.

Next Sunday (7/26). Sabrina Falls will preach the sermon as we reflect on the time that the Israelites spent wandering in the wilderness according to book of Numbers.

Pastoral Team Search Committee update: Yes, exciting news!

The Pastoral search committee has held two virtual meetings with one applicant. We then invited the applicant to come to Indianapolis for in-person meetings. This past Saturday, throughout the day, the applicant met with the search committee, the VAT and the Commission Chairs Team in person, outside the church, with distancing and masks. The search committee met this Tuesday evening and decided to extend an invitation to the applicant to candidate with our congregation.

To review the process: After the committee decides on a primary applicant, they contact some of the references provided by the candidate. That was done before the recent visit. The applicant then meets with the church leadership, informally. This provides the applicant an opportunity to ask questions along with the questions asked by the leadership of the applicant. The search committee then extends an invitation to the applicant to be a candidate. If the applicant agrees to candidate, they also let any other churches with whom they have been in conversation know that they are moving forward with the church where they will candidate. This does not mean that they have been called. It is just the next step. This is the point where we find ourselves.

The applicant has indicated that he will let us know if he wants to candidate with us by July 26. The next step will be for him to preach a sermon and to have an opportunity for members of the congregation to ask him questions. Due to the pandemic, these encounters will all be by Zoom. Prior to that day, the congregation will be provided with a summary of the candidate's biography and strengths that we have identified. Following the sermon and question-and-answer session, the congregation will have the opportunity to vote on whether to call the candidate to come join the pastoral team of our congregation. At least 85% of the congregation will need to affirm the calling for us to move forward.

Please hold the applicant and our congregation in prayer as we discern God's will for our church as we move forward into this exciting time. ~ Jeanne Smucker

Announcements

➤ When we first discussed gathering safely in person, we planned to wait until there were an average of fewer than 5 deaths in the area (central Indiana, Marion County and the adjacent counties) for at least three weeks before returning to the Shalom building. We have now met that benchmark. However, even though deaths continue to be low, the number of new Covid-19 cases is going up steadily. According to the Indiana State Department of Health website https://www.coronavirus.in.gov/2393.htm the average number of new cases a day has gone up from 74 three weeks ago to 133 now. This is much better than some states, but is moving in the wrong direction.

In order to have a hybrid service (some in the building and some at home through Zoom) we need to have 2 tech people in the building, one to run the audio (as on a normal Sunday morning before the pandemic) and one to manage the Zoom component (for example, when people at home want to share with the congregation). Some of our most experienced tech people are over 60 and thus at high risk.

Because of these factors, we have not yet set a date to return to the building. Commission chairs will meet again on July 21 to discuss next steps. ~ Martha Yoder Maust

- ➤ "Give Hope to Live is a program that was started with Nizeet Deiter's sister Fresia Kelley to help COVID-19 patients hospitalized in Tegucigalpa, Honduras. Grace Pointe Community Church of the Nazarene in Maryland is launching a fundraising campaign here in the United States, and you can donate by going to https://pushpay.com/g/gracepointecommunitysevern?r=one and using Fund, then typing "HONDURAS COVID-19 CARE" in the Memo line. - ➤ A few have expressed interest in volunteering for clinical trials of a vaccine for COVID19. Here is information a friend sent to Joyce Troyer: "The National Institutes of Health launched the COVID-19 Prevention Trials Network, part of the effort to find volunteers to test possible COVID-19 vaccines. The network is a combination of four existing federal clinical trial networks at over 100 hospitals and clinics nationwide. It will help researchers find at least 30,000 volunteers, especially people in populations who are most affected by COVID-19, including racial and ethnic minorities, elderly people and pregnant women. The first group of volunteers is expected to test the vaccine candidate developed by Moderna. That study will begin this summer, NIH said. - ➤ There has been a renewed effort led by First Friends of Indianapolis to have the peace churches of our city connect, pool resources, and work together to advocate for justice in our city through nonviolence. This activity is centering around a new website called "The Peace Church Alliance" at https://www.peacechurches.org/feed. We encourage Shalom members to join the site and become informed and involved about the advocacy being sponsored by our fellow pacifist Christians here in Indianapolis.
- In addition to our podcast, Shalom now has a <u>YouTube channel</u>, and many of our Zoom sessions including the sermons in the "Story of the Bible" sermon series and the "Facing Hard Questions" sessions can be found there. Reflections on the Journey

You may have noticed a new occasional feature in Journeying Together. "**Down the Peace Path**" will highlight environmental issues, happenings on the church property, etc. Not necessarily a weekly item but rather will appear as something significant comes up or someone feels inspired to make a submission. This week we'll begin with a little background.

Through the years there have been a number of memorable folks bless our congregational life with their presence. Howard and Sarah Palmatier were one such couple. As many remember, Howard was a kind, no-nonsense Methodist/Mennonite pastor and Navy veteran who did a number of pastoral tasks around Shalom as well as serving as interim pastor for a number of area Mennonite congregations. Sarah was the "herb society lady" in addition to her many other interests.

At some point Sarah came up with the idea of creating a Peace Path at Shalom. Ruth Penner, Becky Wigginton and some others were on board with the project. Mulch was placed and plantings completed over a period of years to form the Peace Path. The path and plants are still there, although they could use some "tender"

loving care" at this point. A fence that was no longer needed separated the path from the woods and was removed some years ago.

In addition to the plants on the Peace Path, at least 26 tree varieties and numerous other native plants have been catalogued at Shalom. Included are invasive plant plants that threaten to take over our woods. Through efforts to remove non-native invasive plants, church members have become familiar with bush honeysuckle, vining honeysuckle, winter creeper and garlic mustard. As these problem plants are removed, native wildflowers like trout lilies have managed to expand their coverage making for some impressive springtime displays of white and yellow flowers.

A new project is currently underway to restore the Northwest corner of the Shalom property. Becky Wigginton remembers walking in that area with Sarah Palmatier in the late 1990's when it was almost completely clear. The first stage of clearing, that is not quite halfway completed, yielded an impressive pile of brush that was reduced to 12 cubic yards of wood chips, thanks to the efforts of a number of Shalom "senior citizens". Those chips have been repurposed to create a path through the woods. The path, originally envisioned by Mil Penner, serves as something of an extension of the original Peace Path and premiered a couple years ago when there were summer activities for youth at Shalom, so the children could have some up close and personal interaction with nature.

So now the trail carpeted in the remnants of invasive plants wends its way past Ash, Beech, Black Cherry, Cottonwood, Maple, Oak and Sycamore trees, a large granite boulder, and numerous other plants, including the ever present invasive plants that we continue to control. You can take a <u>virtual tour</u> of the path or better yet, stop by and take the short hike. You might be pleasantly surprised...
