

REFLECTION ON OUTREACH

For the next few weeks, I am going to be offering some reflections in *Journeying Together* about my time as a pastor here at Shalom and insights I have gained from this experience. Those of you who were here back in 2013 may remember that I was originally hired to be an "Associate Pastor with an emphasis on *outreach*" because the church felt that this was an area where Shalom could use some growth. This was a title I took seriously; it was my primary area of focus for the first few years that I served at Shalom. Therefore, I thought it would make sense for me to begin this reflection series by sharing some of the things I have learned about outreach and its importance in church life.

First, let me acknowledge that "outreach" is not a Biblical term, nor is it a particularly well-defined one. It didn't take me long to discover that "outreach" meant very different things to different people at Shalom. For some, it referred to the call in the gospels to tell the world about Jesus and invite them to follow him. For others, it referred to service to those in need or even political advocacy for the oppressed. Some envisioned outreach as a local neighborhood effort, others as a chance to amplify our pacifist voice in the city of Indianapolis, and still others as a partnership with various faith-based organizations who were doing good things around the country and the world. But despite being vague, the redeeming quality of the word "outreach" is that it makes clear that the church should not only be working toward its own interests like some sort of spiritual country club, but it should be seeking to love people "outside" of our immediate community. Because the temptation to be inward-focused is so strong, that alone makes the term worth keeping.

During those first few years, I spent many hours working with many of you (as well as several people who are no longer at Shalom) to find new ways to reach out to our neighbors. We did "Thriving Thursdays" as a program for neighborhood kids in the summers, we created a network called the "Peace Church Coalition" that sought to promote peace in Indianapolis, we joined campaigns from IndyCAN (later Faith in Indiana) that advocated for policies that benefited the poor and returning citizens, and there were many other projects and programs in addition to these. At times, these programs felt successful, but other times I questioned

whether they made any lasting impact. However, whatever success or failures we had in terms of our original goals, one positive thing came out of each of those experiences: connection.

For an introvert like me, making "connections" does not feel like a particularly meaningful way to spend one's time. If I spend an hour at a neighborhood event talking to people whom I didn't know before, it doesn't automatically feel like I have "done" something important. But in order to learn about people outside of the church – both in terms of their gifts and their needs – and in order to find real ways to make an impact instead of doing something flashy that doesn't really help, you must first develop relationships that are authentic and close enough to make these things clear. I have come to realize that if you develop these relationships, the opportunities for outreach will genuinely flow out of them, but you must first be committed to cultivating the relationships themselves.

As simple as this sounds, it is countercultural and radical in our world today. Our technology is designed to minimize our interactions with people we don't know, to keep us inside of our homes and our cars, and to saturate us with news stories and perspectives that all come from the same perspective. To make an effort simply to meet, learn about, and show care for people whom we don't know – with no predetermined agenda except to "love our neighbors as ourselves" – creates a space where God can work and move in ways that we could never have imagined ourselves. I have found that to be true, and I hope Shalom continues to be committed to this kind of outreach. ~ Brian

PERSON OF COLOR BIO SEPTEMBER 15 – OCTOBER 15 IS HISPANIC HERITAGE MONTH

Hispanic Heritage Month does not cover one single month but instead begins in the middle of September and ends in the middle of October. The timeframe of this is significant because many Central American countries celebrate their independence days within these dates, beginning on the 15th with Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua. By aligning with these independence dates, Hispanic Heritage Month honors the resilience of the Hispanic community. Other independence dates are September 16 for Mexico, the 18th for Chile, and 21st for Belize.

GEORGE

CADLE

PRICE

Belize may be a young nation, but it has been blessed with a true hometown hero in the form of George Cadle Price. Widely known across the land as the Father of the Nation, George Price helped guide this former British colony as it transitioned to a fully sovereign nation in 1981.

George Price was born on January 15, 1919, and passed away on September 19, 2011, at the age of 92. During his lifetime, he saw Belize transition from an isolated agricultural British colony to a free and independent nation that is a regional leader in responsible conservation and environmental stewardship.


Born to a large family with 10 siblings in Belize City, Price nearly died at the tender age of 21 when a hurricane destroyed his high school, only narrowly escaping by swimming away from the collapsed building at the last moment. Originally drawn to the priesthood, Price attended seminary in the United States but felt called to return to his homeland.

Throughout his whole life, George Price dedicated himself to improving the people of Belize. In the 1940s, Price began writing for the Belize Billboard, an influential newspaper that was run by Philip S. W. Goldson. Price first entered political life in 1944 when he ran for a position on

the Belize City Council. After falling short in 1944, he kept trying and was eventually elected in 1947.

Price faced his first difficult challenge in 1949 when the British Honduran dollar (as the currency was then known) was steeply devalued. Price then assembled a group of leading citizens to form the People's Committee in order to address the economy's needs. This committee formed the nucleus of what later became the People's United Party (PUP) in 1950. Later that same year, Price gave a now-famous speech in which he called for national unity. In 1954, Price was elected to the brand-new Legislative Assembly. From 1956 to 1962, Price served as the mayor of Belize City. In 1961, he was elected as the First Minister, then the highest office in the land available to Belizeans.

As First Minister, he initiated the process for Belize to become an independent country, which finally occurred in 1981. After independence, Price became the first Prime Minister of Belize and served in various government posts until 1996. In 2000, Price became the first person to be given the Order of National Hero, the highest honor in Belize. https://www.belizehub.com/george-price-belize/
